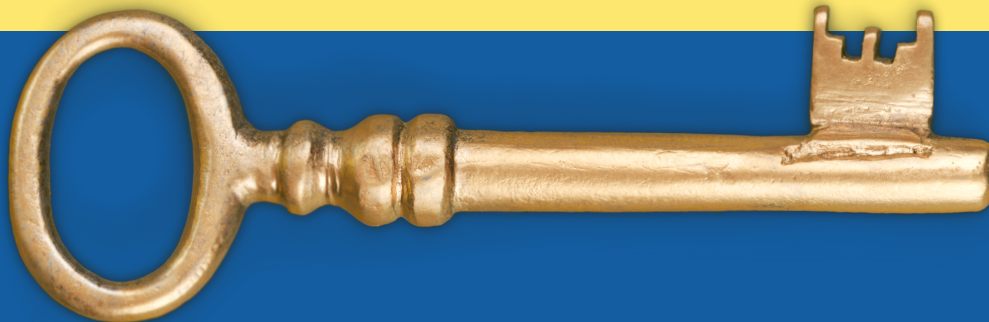

BEFORE THE GROUND SHAKES

Steve Eberlein

Ethos Preparedness



Steve Eberlein and his wife were living in Sri Lanka when a massive tsunami struck the country, taking 35,000 there and 200,000 others in communities surrounding the Indian Ocean. Their work on the Lanka Tsunami Response Team took them to every tsunami-impacted district, where they saw firsthand the toll that disasters take on unprepared countries and communities.

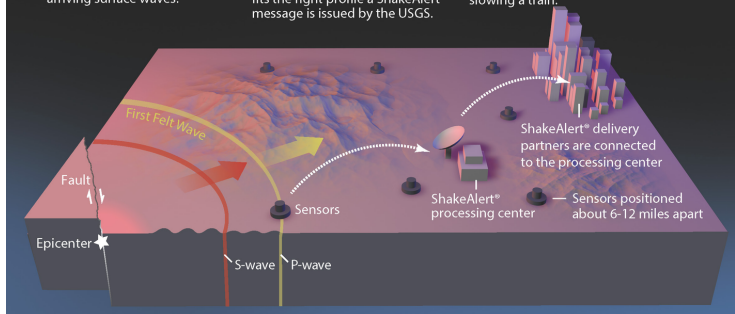
Only upon returning to the US did they learn that my native Pacific Northwest is awaiting a very similar event: a tsunami-generating subduction zone earthquake. Since 2016, Steve has dedicated his career to disaster preparedness education and advocacy, with a particular focus on communities and workplaces that will be impacted by the Cascadia Subduction Zone and San Andreas Fault system. He's delivered more than 200 earthquake preparedness presentations, reaching more than 25,000 audience members.

The aim of his work is best embodied by his 2018 TEDx Talk, "Why we do not prepare for earthquakes." Disaster unpreparedness is a fragile cultural phenomenon that can be undone if enough people step up to the challenge. His role is to recruit new voices to the challenge.



ShakeAlert® Earthquake Early Warning Basics

- 1 During an earthquake, a rupturing fault sends out different types of waves. The fast-moving P-wave is first to arrive, followed by the slower S-wave and later-arriving surface waves.
- 2 Sensors detect the P-wave and immediately transmit data to a ShakeAlert® processing center where the location, size, and estimated shaking of the quake are determined. If the earthquake fits the right profile a ShakeAlert® message is issued by the USGS.
- 3 A ShakeAlert® message is then picked up by delivery partners (such as a transportation agency) that could be used to produce an alert to notify people to take a protective action such as Drop, Cover, and Hold On and/or trigger an automated action such as slowing a train.

RICHARD DONOVAN

Richard Donovan joined OSBA as a legislative specialist in September 2016. Previously, Richard served for four years as the committee administrator for the House and Senate Committees on Education at the Oregon Legislature. In that role, he was responsible for all aspects of legislative policy committee work, including bill management, policy analysis, and procedural expertise. Previously, Richard worked at the New York City Department of Education in the Office of Student Enrollment, where he was part of a team responsible for placing more than 100,000 students in high school annually. He has also worked in international business, living and working for a time in Manila, Philippines.

Richard received a bachelor's degree from Washington College and a Juris Doctor degree from Vermont Law School. In law school, he worked for a semester in the chambers of Judge Richard M. Berman in the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of New York. In his spare time, Richard enjoys spending time with his family, as well as annually having his hopes and dreams crushed by the team of his youth, the New York Mets.

Sex Abuse Prevention and Sexual Conduct Legal Requirements

McKenzie Nix is the Sexual Assault and Molestation Prevention Specialist for PACE. McKenzie is an Air Force veteran and former Oregon State University soccer player. She graduated from OSU in 2017 with her Bachelors in Kinesiology and her Master's in Sports Industry Management from Georgetown University in 2019.

Prior to working with PACE, McKenzie served as the Special Assistant to the Athletics Director at Wright State University in Dayton, Ohio. McKenzie managed the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC), all special projects for the Athletics Director, and developed annual Life Skills seminars for student-athletes that centralized around 7-dimensions of wellness. In 2020, McKenzie helped organize the first ever Power Based Violence workshop for student-athletes. The workshop focused on sexual assault, as well as power dynamics in all types of relationships, consent, active bystanders, and intersectionality.

Tonyia joined OSBA's legal department in 2020. Prior to joining OSBA, she worked as an employment litigator at a small firm in Salem, Oregon for over 9 years.
